Holdfast Credit Union Beginning with Budgeting - Naomi Claxton



Budget airlines...budget holidays...budget hotels...when I think of those, I think cheap and basic, no frills, no fun. However, 'budget' doesn't mean cheap at all - the best example of that is probably The budget, the spending plans of the government. In the 2021-22 period, there was income of £929 billion, and spending of £1.045 trillion, and an £116 billion overspend. I find it really hard to picture huge numbers like that. If you think about it as time instead of money, a million seconds is about 11.6 days. A billion seconds is about 32 years....so clearly 'budget' doesn't mean cheap! It just means having a plan for your money.

Budgeting is a really valuable life skill, but it is not taught at schools, and many people have grown up in homes where either nobody else had the knowledge to pass on to them, or money just wasn't talked about.

Making a budget can feel scary, especially in these times when costs are going up and up and incomes are staying the same, or falling. However scary it feels, having a clear picture of your finances is the first step in taking control of them and making some changes. If you have not had an easy history with money, it can be easy to think that you are 'just no good with money' but the truth is, anyone can improve their financial situation with the right support.

At the most basic level, making a budget is finding out how much money you have coming in, how much you have going out, and hopefully finding that there is some left over. You can do this with pen and paper, a spreadsheet, or there are lots of apps (both free and paid for) that can help. You can have an overall budget for your spending, and make smaller ones within that - for example a groceries budget, or Christmas budget. In your outgoings, you will have some costs that are either fixed, or you can't influence (for example your mortgage and council tax) and others that fluctuate and you have an element of control over - things like your groceries and discretionary spending money.

The key here is to not only work out what you think you should be spending in these categories, but what you actually have been spending, by going back through your bank statements. When you aren't tracking your spending, it can be easy to spend a lot in small amounts that add up. If you find you need to reduce your spending in an area, it is better to try and cut back a smaller amount over a few months rather than one big cut, as that can feel too difficult.

Budgets work best when you check in on them regularly through the month. A five-minute check at the start of each week can have a really positive effect on your finances. It gives you a chance to make any adjustments you need to before things get out of hand.

We can also help if you would like to start a savings account to put money aside for things like car tax, insurance, and servicing, or ready for Christmas.

We would also love to hear from you if you have any good budgeting ideas to share, or tips to save money, or make it go further. My husband's best tip, that he tells me often is - it is a budget, not a target!

How do you take your tea? Milk? Sugar? Plastic? - Naomi Claxton

Plastic?

Yes, plastic! Many manufacturers add polypropylene plastic to the teabag paper to help heat seal them. Unfortunately this means that when they are composted, they break down releasing tiny pieces of plastic (known as microplastic) into the soil. Microplastics are now being found in the soil, sea, and



our drinking water, as well as fish and animals. This means that we are ingesting microplastics, the long term effect of which is not yet known.

Teabags are not the only source of microplastics, but considering more than 60 billion cups of tea are drunk per year in the UK alone, it is certainly worth trying to make sure that we are choosing plastic free teabags wherever possible.

It is worth noting that some tea manufacturers have started to use polylactic acid, or PLA instead of polypropylene - however while this is plant based plastic, it is still plastic. Another consideration is that PLA can come from genetically modified crops, and also are not suitable for home composting.

There is not necessarily a perfect choice (loose leaf tea may well be the closest to this), and as with so many green matters, there are different aspects to consider, and we all have to make the best choice we can for our own lives, families, and budgets. Life does not have to be all or nothing either - I have milk delivered in glass bottles on a Monday, and then plastic the rest of the week, as I don't have it in my budget to have only milk in glass bottles. The glass bottles get reused, and the plastic ones recycled. Big change comes from lots of people doing the best they can, rather than a small number of people doing everything perfectly.

Compostable Tea Bags - Home Compost Heap

<u>Clipper</u> string and tag bags are home compostable, as well as being fair trade. You can buy them in bulk online which gives best value for money. I can attest to it being a good cup of tea! <u>Pukka</u> tea bags can also be home composted, as can <u>Nemi</u> tea.

Industrially Compostable Tea Bags - Council Food Waste Bin

<u>Asda</u> own brands including their Just Essentials can go in your food waste bin, as can bags from <u>Bird & Blend</u> tea, <u>Brew Tea</u>, <u>Co-Op 99</u> (also fairtrade), <u>PG Tips</u>, <u>Sainsburys</u>, <u>TeaPigs</u>, <u>TickTock</u>, and <u>Yorkshire</u>.

Tea Bags Containing Plastic

Apart from their Specially Selected Infustion tea bags, <u>Aldi</u> tea bags are heat-sealed using polypropylene plastic, as are <u>Lidl</u>, although Lidl's pyramid teabags use PPA instead. Surprisingly to me, <u>Marks & Spencer</u> and <u>Waitrose</u> have not removed plastic from their entire ranges. M&S is only plastic free in their herbal range, and Waitrose own brand decaf tea bags still contain plastic.

The Others

Neither <u>Tesco</u> or <u>Morrisons</u> have put out any information to say their own brand teabags are plastic free. <u>Tetley</u> is in the process of switching from plastic heat sealing, and <u>Twinings</u> have committed to being plastic-free by 2025.

If your favourite brand is not yet plastic free, write, email, or tweet them asking them to change. Consumer pressure can have a big influence. You could switch to that brand's loose leaf option if they offer one, or perhaps just try a new brand. Other eco-tips include descaling your kettle using citric acid or white vinegar instead of buying descaler, and only boiling enough water as you need, to save energy. After all that, I think I need a cup of tea!

Frugal Recipe from our very own Masterchef - but it is not us!

Red Lentil Dahl - Serves 4 for under £2

A quick and easy curry, for when time or money is tight.

1 onion, chopped (I often use frozen)
 1 400g can chopped tomatoes
 1 400g coconut milk (can use light)
 200g split red lentils

2 tbsp curry powder, mild or medium according to your taste, OR ¹/₂ tsp each ginger, coriander, turmeric, and a pinch of dried chillis, OR your own selection of spices

Optional - garlic, spinach, lemon juice, shredded left over cooked chicken, yogurt

Fry your onion on a low heat in a little oil until soft. Add garlic if you are using, and your spices.

Stir in your lentils, the chopped tomatoes, and coconut milk. Stir well. Simmer slowly for twenty minutes, stirring to make sure it does not stick, and add a little water from the kettle if it seems too thick. It should be thick enough that you can scoop it up with flatbreads. Add the lemon juice at the end if you are using it.

If you are adding spinach and/or chicken, stir it in towards the end until the spinach is wilted and the chicken heated through.

Serve in bowls with a swirl of yogurt if you are using it, and toasted flatbreads, naan, or pitta.

Leftovers will keep in the fridge or can be frozen. Nice reheated with a splash of water to loosen (it will thicken on cooling) and served with a poached or fried egg.

Great Totham URC - Jean Moody Easter Article by Rev Peter Stevenson

The gospel writers tell the story of the resurrection in different ways. Parallel readings of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John reveals something of the importance that each writer places on the event. I am using the traditional dating of the gospels, Matthew and Luke (AD 85-90), Mark (AD 66-70) and John (AD 90-110). The readings can be found Matthew 28, Mark 16, Luke 24 and John 20 and each start on the first day after the Sabbath, (very) early in the morning as day breaks. There is no agreement who went to the tomb beyond Mary Magdalene who appears in Matthew, Mark and John). While all the accounts have concern that the stone at the entrance of the tomb will be an obstacle, it is only in Matthew that we learn that an angel moves it after a violent earthquake. Elsewhere is the stone has been rolled away or removed.

The first three gospels are clear that heavenly being(s) are present. Matthew refers to the angel while Mark has 'a young man dressed in white', and Luke refers to two men 'in clothes that gleamed like lightning'. The responses to the women in Matthew and Mark similarly assure them not to be afraid and explain that 'Jesus is not here but has risen' and to return to the disciples with the news. Luke does not give the assurance and does not name Jesus but agrees that he is 'not here; he has risen'. Luke reminds them of Jesus' words and offers no instruction to return to the disciples.

On their return to the disciples, Matthew says the women were 'filled with joy', while Mark says that they were 'trembling and bewildered' and Luke does not express the emotions. It is thought that Mark may have originally ended at this point, however the longer ending describes an encounter between Jesus and Mary Magdalene which, 'they did not believe'. Matthew has a sudden meeting with an instruction to 'Go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me'. In Luke the appearance is by way of an encounter with Cleopas on the Emmaus Road before appearing to the disciples.

Luke also has Peter running to the tomb to see for himself what was reported by the women. Neither Matthew nor Mark record this. The prominence of Peter is described in John who has Mary running to Simon Peter (and the beloved disciple) after finding the stone removed. Although slower than his younger friend, it is Peter who first looks into the tomb. Mary is left alone when the disciples return to their homes and following a conversation with two angels, Jesus (mistaken as a gardener) appears to her. She then tells the disciples and later in the evening Jesus appears to them in a locked room minus Thomas of course.

It is interesting that such a significant event is recorded differently. The essential truth is that Jesus was, is and always will be resurrected. We can also be sure that to prove the truth, he appeared in a number of different ways to the disciples and followers. His ascension may deny us the opportunity of a physical encounter with the risen Lord Jesus, but through the Holy Spirit we are assured of his presence. So let us affirm that Christ has died, Christ is risen and Christ will come again and celebrate this great alleluia moment in the Christian year!

You are really important to Sister J and the women she meets. " We need a lot of prayers from supporters all over the world. " she says.

Isn't it a privilege that we can stand alongside these persecuted believers not just from North Korea but from many countries around the world. In the Open Doors World Watch list 360 million Christians face persecution and discrimination for their faith including believers in Nigeria, Afghanistan, Iran and more. Your prayers and support can mean these courageous believers and the next generation of the church can keep going.

Deborah - A Powerful Woman in the Bible

A prophetess and honoured judge, Deborah is one of the most aweinspiring women of the Bible. A great role model for all for those called to lead. Deborah, "held court under the Palm of Deborah .. and the Israelites went up to her to have their disputes decided." (Judges 4:5).

Deborah - being empowered to become a leader

But ill health can quickly become a barrier to bright futures. "my children have agonised over amoebas, typhoid and worms, sometime three to four times a month. It's a common problem in many homes", shares Tamari, Deborah's mum.Thanks to intervention, Deborah and 244 other children received a water filter to curb the widespread water-borne infections of the project. Tamari is delighted in the change to her children's health as a result. Right now, I am just happy that Deborah's health is improving."

Martha - faith-filled woman of the Bible

A personal friend of Jesus, Martha lived in Bethany with her brother Lazarus and sister Mary. In John 11, Lazarus fall seriously ill and despite sending a message to Jesus asking for help, Lazarus passed away before Jesus arrives. However, Martha's absolute faith in Jesus shines through when she runs to meet him.

Jesus does the miraculous and resurrects Lazarus to complete and full health. How amazing it is witness that strength of faith, to be so convinced of God's provision and power. Through Martha's story we learn the importance of trusting God even when all seems lost.

Martha - a woman of determination

Martha from Indonesia is all a faith-filled woman whose strength in the face of adversity shines through,

When Martha was just five years old, she lost part of leg when she was hit by a motorcycle. She refused to let this horrible accident define or stop her No matter what life throws at her, Martha is determined to give her children the best possible life.
