Pastoral letter - Looking Forward

Dear Friends

The air is a buzz, not just with wildlife, not simply the lovely colours of spring flowers but with expectation. People, at last are planning to travel, to visit and unleash their long suppressed ideas for the future. Audrey and I met a friend yesterday who hadn't been able to see her son in South Africa for 2 years. She said with glee, "I've booked it and I'm flying on Tuesday". As we emerge from the terrible effects of the Covid-19 pandemic we are bursting with hope.

Now, I am not ignoring the terrible events unfolding in Ukraine and the suffering being inflicted on innocent people at the whim of a tyrant. We must hope and pray that, with help from like-minded people in Europe, peace and justice will prevail.

We have been remembering the suffering and death of Jesus at Easter. From that horror came the miraculous resurrection of our Saviour and thereafter, the gift of the Holy Spirit and the founding of the Christian Church. All those who had been inspired by Jesus and his disciples became part of a movement from which modern Christendom developed.

Human failings, however lead to different views of events and, as we all do, gaps in knowledge tend to be filled with ideas that may be inaccurate. Disputes and arguments within and between churches are never far away now and in the past. Fortunately for the early Church, Paul galvanised and chided members of new churches to remember the teachings of Jesus. The letters that Paul wrote to the people in cities and communities in the eastern Mediterranean, such as Corinth, Ephesus and Philippi served to guide and encourage the new Christians along their path with Jesus. He exhorts the people to be sure that everything they do is to the Glory of God. I like to draw a parallel with enthusiasts who do their own car maintenance. In the past such petrol-heads needed the appropriate Hayes Manual to do that. Paul's letters are not so prescriptive but I like the idea that Paul's letters are the guides for life.

In our modern Church we must look forward and treasure the joys that surround us. Keeping our eyes on what Jesus taught us and how he suffered for us must be our focus. Let us be inclusive and welcoming but temper our actions with the examples set for us by Jesus, his disciples and the wise counsel of Paul.

May the Grace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with you all.

Would you help us help them? House of Grace Witham is aiming to provide supported accommodation in our community.

WHO?

'House of Grace (Witham)' is a new local Christian charity working in partnership with the national social enterprise 'Green Pastures' to provide supported housing for those needing help to 'get back on their feet' after suffering homelessness.

WHAT?

We will lease a house bought by 'Green Pastures' and find residents from referral agencies. Residents' housing benefit will pay for the lease and a team of volunteers will maintain the property and provide practical courses for them. We expect residents to be ready to move on after about eighteen months in the 'House of Grace'.

HOW?

We will need to raise funds to equip and maintain the property. We would also look to fund residents who access courses provided by other organisations, e.g. carpentry.

We will also offer therapeutic sessions in learning to play the guitar or keyboard and/or attend an art or craft session

Some residents will need to learn about budgeting and handling their finances in general.

Two friends could become volunteers to befriend and support the same resident, in case one goes on holiday or needs to isolate etc so there will always be a backup system in place.

'So painful and disheartening'

For Jessica, drought means every day is a struggle for survival.

Like many women in rural Zimbabwe - 7 out of 10 rely on farming for income and food - she toils on her farm, but nothing can grow on her ashen, dry land.

Drought starves. Intensified by the climate crisis, and the effects of war in Ukraine on global food production, it drives families into hunger.

Jessica recalls that 'One year, we had no rain. The scorching sun burnt my crops just as they were about to bloom. It was so painful and disheartening.'

It's unjust that drought - exacerbated by the effects of conflict and the global pandemic - robs Jessica of the power to provide for her family. Her husband is unwell, so she's the only breadwinner. Her children look up to her, but she has nothing left to give. Once before, when things were desperate, Jessica asked her neighbours for food but she came home with nothing.

Jessica is anything but helpless. In the face of drought, her love for her family gives her courage to stand strong - and we stand with Jessica.

My children give me the power to go ahead... I pray they have a better future.

Praying for Putin



Word for the Week Old Testament Not a word from their mouth can be trusted; Their heart is filled with malice. Their throat is an open grave; with their tongues they tell lies.

Psalm 5:9

Remind you of anyone?

There's nothing like a real-life dictator who's indifferent to the misery and mayhem he wreaks to bring David's conflict psalms to life. Indeed, whilst it is deeply unwise to suppose that God is on any particular side in a war, there are times when, despite our own sinfulness and rebellion, the evil of one side is so clear that we can be as sure as any human can that God stands against it. 'The bloodthirsty and the deceitful you, Lord, detest.' (Psalm 5:6)

How we then pray for Putin is another question. In the weeks before the war, I prayed that God might raise up an Esther to whisper restraint into his life. I prayed that God might humble him as he humbled Nebuchadnezzar. And I hoped that the Lord in his mercy was not using him like the King of Assyria to discipline us for our rebellion (Isaiah 7:17).

As ever, the psalms help us pray.

First, we must be honest, as David is – calling out the actions and attitudes of his enemies as he sees them. Putin is a self-absorbed, conscience-less, cunning despot and many of us have no doubt felt, as Bonhoeffer did in

relation to Hitler, that his death would be the swiftest way to reduce the suffering of literally tens of millions of people. I find no contradiction in praying for his salvation and his removal from power, though I find myself unable to ask for his death.

Second, the psalmists are honest with God about their vengeful, murderous feelings towards their enemies. We may well have similar feelings. And whilst it is right to repent of them swiftly, it is also right to express them to God – he knows anyway. And when we don't process such feelings about our enemies, it only gets harder to genuinely want God's best for them.

Third, David reminds us that we are not in control. God is. And justice will indeed one day be done. In the meantime, we pray for a swift resolution to the war, the protection of the innocent, wisdom and courage for our leaders, homes for the refugees, and healing for all from the sulphuric ravages of this diabolic tyranny.
