### **Dear Friends**

### "Draw near to God, and he will draw near to you." James 4:8

As I'm writing this month's pastoral letter, I'm having to squint because my computer screen is filled with reflection of the sun shining a glorious blue sky and the green of the grass... What a wonderful problem to have!

Lately it feels like we live in a world filled with problems. Mental health has taken a battering after 2 years of uncertainty, and just when it feels like we're getting our heads above the sand after the COVID pandemic, we're faced with the prospect of war with Russia, a cost of living and energy crisis which sees higher inflation than we've experienced in 40 years, news story upon news story of criminal acts and dishonesty by those entrusted to lead us, and record profits being made by fuel giants while we're paying record prices at the pumps.

Some of us are tightening our belts, others are afraid of what may be hiding around the corner, many of us are angry and the rest are just waiting for it to blow over. I know I've been all four at different times of different days.

A couple of months ago Fenella wrote about Peter denying that he knew Jesus, and weeping bitterly afterwards. Perhaps we aren't denying Jesus in the midst of what's happening around us, but are we seeking him? Are we trusting that although we face trials that God will see us through?

As we look around, it gets increasingly difficult to find God in any of what's happening, It would be wrong to compare our trials to the suffering of Job, but we can take inspiration from him. In the midst of his suffering, he never turned his back to God, but asked him why?

I've found encouragement in an old friend of mine. Last year I got an out of the blue text message from the last person I'd expect to ask for a Bible. This year I've regularly been tested and challenged by him as he asks me questions about the scriptures and points out perspectives I've never seen or heard spoken.

"These trials will show that your faith is genuine. It is being tested as fire tests and purifies gold—though your faith is far more precious than mere gold. So when your faith remains strong through many trials, it will bring you much praise and glory and honour on the day when Jesus Christ is revealed to the whole world." 1 Peter 1:7

### Life on the Breadline: A Way Forward - Andy Blackett

This is a follow up article to the one I previously wrote about the lent course, Life On the Breadline in April's WURC magazine. I know of one of our home groups has used the material as the bases of their study and would encourage others to do the same. It is a study into the Christian response to the effects of austerity, poverty, inequality, ethnic disparities and housing. See: breadlineresearch.coventry.au.uk/churches/lent-course The final session set out an Anti-poverty charter, designed for the local church to sign up to. One of charter statements is to challenge the myths told about contemporary poverty. Another key theme from the course and discussion during each session was 'What can we do as a church'.

I want to encourage you to think about how you on a personal level respond to poverty as portrayed by our politicians and sections of the media. Would you choose to be poor as a life style? The poor are often looked down on, as if they choose to have their washing machine breakdown or the child's shoes need replacing at the same time or having to choose between eating or heating. The majority of working people and families are one pay packet from entering poverty and debt (they lack the savings). The majority of those receiving unemployment benefits or even in work benefits are keen to be off them. It's a strain just getting by when your housing or your job is insecure or you just lack the financial ability to put food on the table. Coping can sap the energy needed to seek ways out. Many do try, hence the multiple jobs of many of those on low income. But even that has consequences in a pro rata reduction of benefits, a catch 22 situation! What impact does that then have on family life especially the children? Or your time in trying to look for a job. Cutting benefits in order to increase job seeking has the paradoxical effect of making it harder. (See: Poverty by Ruth Lister. Ruth is a member of the House of Lords and Emeritus Professor of Social Policy, Loughborough University).

A number of ministers seem intent on putting the causes of poverty squarely on the shoulders of those in poverty! By saying they do not budget

properly, or don't work enough hours, or as Jacob Rees-Mog has said "the use of food banks is rather uplifting" Really!

Poverty is on the increase as unprecedented inflation impacts on more of our community, the Resolution Foundation estimates absolute poverty and material deprivation will rise by 1.3 million including 0.5 million children in 2022/23

Our choice is both to tackle some of the political causes and our attitude linked to those in poverty, along with what the church can do in helping them to develop the appropriate skills, without looking down on them, to make them feel valued and an important part of our community.


From my discussion with Fenella and Heather at the centre it became evident that for many struggling in poverty or on the brink, the lack of home skills is a stumbling block to enabling limited finance to go further. It's a choice of the ready cooked meal or highly processed food used to save time (not always nutritional and or expensive) or the belief that cooking using fresh ingredients is even more expensive and time consuming. Some of their plans include a family tea time once a week. Here all ages would work together to prepare, cook and eat a meal. Providing hands on experience of simple nutritional meals that are easy to cook and prepare with a few basic ingredients.

Small talk is providing a much needed outreach to enable parents to meet together, and they hope to make links with the group Next Chapter. (domestic violence) The Centre would like to link up some basic early years health care provision as well. Big Talk is also proving to be a success and again could link into providing cooking skills. At the other end of the age spectrum is Memories and More (dementia suffers and their carers) and the lunch club. The Centre is also a base for Holdfast Credit Union, providing financial help and support.

The Centre provides a golden opportunity to reach out to our community to show practical help, as Peter did in Acts chapter 3. The lame man walked,

so solving the cause. (Life on the breadline session 3) Our role is not to just give food but to enable the causes to be rectified by promoting a more equitable society through our politicians and pass on skills and support missing from current society.

We need to be an all inclusive church both on a Sunday and to the activities/service we provide mid week. But as always to do more requires helpers, could you help treat the cause. I would like to leave you with this comment said to Heather at the end of a Big Talk session "people like us are not welcome. We say as a church " YOU MOST CERTAINLY ARE!

An estimated 100,000 people are in some form of modern slavery here in the UK. The global figure is 40.3 million. Women, children and men are trafficked into prostitution, pornography, agriculture and building labour, manufacturing, domestic servitude, forced begging, benefit fraud, petty criminality and organ removal (care.org.uk).

#### DEAR FRIEND.

Thank you for your continued interest in and prayers for CARE.

Later this year, we'll be announcing our long-term plans for CARE's work. In the meantime, I wanted to briefly share with you how your support helps restrain harmful legislation and promote Government action that serve the peace and prosperity of our nation (Jeremiah 29:7).

Since Joining CARE last year, I have been struck by how our work depends on the prayers, gifts and donations of many thousands of individual supporters. We are not funded by a few rich benefactors or large institutions. Our work depends on regular falthful supporters whose generosity enables us to achieve remarkable results and make a real difference in the lives of so many who need protecting.

Over the last twelve months, donations to CARE have led to breakthroughs in:

- · greater protection for vulnerable women trafficked into the UK,
- changes in UK Government policy on age verification that will mean children are better protected from accessing pornography,
- stopping attempts to legalise assisted suicide from succeeding,
- proclaiming a compassionate gospel voice in the debates around conversion therapy and gender recognition; and
- providing churches with resources to be able to minister with grace and compassion to those facing unintended pregnancy or post-abortion concerns.

These changes alone would be a great return on the support we receive, but in God's economy, every penny makes a difference now and in the future. As in the parable of the sower, where gospel seeds are widely scattered, we have been able to sow seeds that have born and will bear wonderful fruit far beyond the boundary of our own field.

For example, our Leadership Programme, which started with just two young graduates, eager to deepen their understanding of God's word and how it applies to politics and public life. Almost 30 years later, the Programme now has more than 300 alumni. They have all benefited from a combination of bible teaching, guidance from experienced Christian leaders and internships in the Houses of Parliament.

Our graduates have gone on to become cabinet ministers and leading politicians across the UK, ambassadors, senior civil servants, charity chief executives, church leaders, and entrepreneurs. Indeed, one of those first two Leadership Programme interns now works across international conflict areas and was instrumental in rescuing many who had to flee the Taliban when they came to power in Afghanistan last year.
