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Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends,

We have all read the bible and probably viewed the events taking place against the countryside that we know. A stable being on a dairy farm in the Cotswolds. A dark valley being in the lowlands in Snowdonia, or the lake district. With the events in the bible being in a land that many of us have never visited, it is hard to see these events in their true circumstances.

Visiting Cairo allowed us to recall the story of Joseph being sold into slavery in Egypt and Moses in a basket on the Nile. It was hard to imagine a baby in a reed basket as we travelled along the Nile, with built up hotels and apartments lining the banks. Away from the immediate impact of the river and its life-giving water, the dryness and barrenness of the landscape. A place with little "green" and much rock, sand and the general appearance of an in-progress building site.

We visited the three main pyramids in Giza and marvelled at the size of the stone constructions with stones weighing up to 16t. We stood looking at the Sphinx, and turning around, saw how close modern Giza is with its ubiquitous McDonalds feet away. The hardness of life in such a dry place. The transformation made by water.

We also visited the ruins of the port city of Ephesus. Now 5km from the sea, we walked through the city from one end to the other. Past the remains of shops, baths, temples, and to a magnificent amphitheatre where Paul almost certainly spoke during his visit to the city 2000 years ago. To stand where Paul had stood. To the place that received Paul's Letter to Ephesians, and one of the seven churches in Revelations. To a place long abandoned following an earthquake which levelled the city.

Finally, to Rome. To the city that is an open-air museum of Roman building and remains. The impressive Colosseum which could seat 60,000 people. The same number of people as the London Stadium, but 2000 years older! The shear size of the building, and the fact that it is still standing. We also

stood in St. Peter's Square and looked onto St. Peter's Basilica dominating the skyline.

Jesus said "but whoever drinks the water I give will never be thirsty. The water I give will become a spring of water gushing up inside that person giving eternal life." (John 4:14)

May you be filled with the life giving waters of Christ!

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Banana Nice Cream - our Witham URC Masterchef

If you have overripe bananas they are easy to turn into ice cream – or Nice cream, as it is healthy, cheap, saves on food waste, and tastes great!



Peel your overripe banana/s, cut into thick pieces and put in a freezer bag or Tupperware. Freeze for a few hours or until you want to make your ice cream.

Take them out of the freezer, let them stand for a minute or two, then put them into a food processor or blender, or use a stick blender to whiz them up.

You can serve it as it is or add some honey, some vanilla, cocoa powder, berries, whatever you have to hand to it.

It does not keep well, so make it just before you want to serve it.

If you don't have anything to blend it with you can try mashing the bananas before freezing, then mashing again when frozen, although the texture will not be as smooth.

Growing Greener with Holdfast

My morning walk to school and then on to work takes me along the brook and then river walk, and at this time of year I cannot help but notice how abundantly green everything is. Some mornings it feels like you could almost hear the nettles growing! I've bought some tomato plants



from an honesty stand putting money straight into the purse of a local grower, and hopefully putting some delicious fresh tomatoes onto my plate with no food miles or plastic packaging, the satisfaction of growing my own, and getting many more tomatoes from my £1 plant than that could buy me at the supermarket.

I've also been enjoying food for free by foraging for local nettles and turning them into soup and pesto. The trick here is to wear gardening gloves when you harvest them, harvest the topmost leaves only as they are the most tender, and to not take too many from one place. Nettles are surprisingly delicious, incredibly nutritious, and don't sting once they have been cooked. Making soup from them is easy, and a bit like stone soup in that you can add in whatever you like to it. I usually soften a chopped onion, or leek if I have one, add in some stock (made from the leftovers from a roast chicken is particularly nice, but a stock cube will do) then add my nettles and perhaps a handful of spinach or watercress, or other greens that are looking a bit sad in the fridge. You can add in a diced potato at the start if you want more of a hearty soup, and at the end you can perk it up with a spoonful of pesto or crème fraiche, plain yogurt, or cream.

Nettle pesto is similarly flexible – make sure you blanch your nettles in boiling water to take away the sting first, then add to a food processor (or you can use a stick blender) with some garlic cloves, olive or rapeseed oil, some grated hard cheese, and some pine nuts. You want at least half a cup of nettles once they have been blanched – they wilt in much the same way

as spinach, so be generous when you pick them. Blitz everything up, have a taste, add lemon juice or basil or other herbs if you want to, perhaps a little more oil, tweak it to your own preferences. This tastes so good on freshly cooked pasta!

When you grown your own and forage for yourself, it can help save money on your grocery shopping. If you are looking to grow your savings, perhaps ready for Christmas, or just for a rainy day, Holdfast can help with a savings account for you. Sometimes it feels like there is no point saving if you don't have a lot to save, but every little bit really does add up, and there could easily come a time when you will be glad that you did.

When you grow your savings with us, you are also growing your community, as it allows us to help people with small loans that banks would not find profitable enough to make themselves. Your money stays completely safe ready for you when you want it, and until then it helps other people in our community. Great Totham URC - Jean Moody Article by Rev Peter Stevenson

There is only one place I can talk about this month having travelled to Egypt, visiting the Pyramids at Giza and enjoying the highlights of Cairo before transferring to Luxor for a cruise along the Nile. We cruised south to Aswan stopping at Esna and Kom Ombo. We visited a number of temples and places of interest and scratched the surface of the ancient Egyptian world.

Pharoahs date back to 3000 BCE with the first pyramid thought to be the Stepped Pyramid of Djoser, west of Cairo near Saqqara. Their big concern was to live eternally beyond the time afforded to them on earth. Over the next three thousand years a number of dynasties *ruled* Egypt, the country often being conquered by their neighbours. This in turn, elevated some Gods to places of high importance, albeit for just a season, until another God was preferred by a different Pharoah. Intrigue, jealousy, filicide and fratricide were rarely far from the royal court, resulting in some short-lived pharaohs and changes in dynastic superiority.

The situation is further complicated by the two-kingdom of ancient Egypt. Some pharaohs ruled both kingdom at the same time but some only ruled north (lower) or south (upper) territories. This has an impact on the way Exodus is read and makes it virtually impossible to be accurate about the true impact that the pharaonic period has on the early history of the people of God. Even before this, Abraham is fearful that a Pharoah will kill him and take his wife Sarai away. At the end of Genesis, we learn about Joseph's rise to vizier of Egypt.

At the beginning of Exodus, we learn that there is a new pharaoh in town who is fearful that the Hebrew people are getting stronger and has ordered the death of male babies. The hieroglyphics in the temples that we visited do not support this story and our guides were quite dismissive of the truth of this claim.

It looks like there is some further and additional studying needed to learn why the Hebrew text insists on this being the birth of the God's people. If you have the answers please respond via the magazine.
