# Friday Afternoon Bible Study Group Outing -Muriel Heppinstall

Over the years we have been on some memorable outings with our leader, Vikki, all related in some way with our faith.



We have been to the National Gallery to look at and pray in front of old master paintings of Biblical

scenes. When someone explains all the detail and thought that goes into a painting, it takes on a deeper meaning. We have done several local 'Church Crawls' looking at interesting local churches (after visiting Long Melford during a very frosty December, we resolved always to have summer outings

- there was no heating and we froze!)

This summer we went to St Edmundsbury Cathedral in Bury St Edmunds to see the tapestries 'Threads Through Creation'. They were amazing. 'In the beginning God' - how do you draw God? Jacqui Parkinson thought and thought and eventually came up with a rainbow spiral with three strands for the Trinity. This starts small in

the middle and gets larger as it spirals out and the bigger spirals contain tiny images of what will be created. This spiral was repeated in many ways

in many of the subsequent panels.



Day two was represented with black and white triangles, but if you looked closely, each triangle was covered in repeated, almost invisible spirals. Panels three and four showed water and the green earth, then panel five was the universe: We couldn't tear Mary away from this one, she checked out all the astronomy, which got her approval!

Panel six was the creatures in the sea, and seven the birds and animals. I could go on and on –

On the seventh day God rested so Jacqui embroidered a cross with a spiral

superimposed and with all six days of creation in the background, God admiring his handiwork.

Then disaster! The devil takes the form of an angel being cast out of heaven, so the story of the fall is woven in and the final panel is the eviction from the beautiful Garden of Eden.

Unsurprisingly I have been reflecting on Ecclesiastes 3 and time; when things can be done and when it is better not to do things – when the time is wrong. It sounds easy and indeed would be if the decision was taken in isolation without having to refer to anyone else.

Life is often controlled by time; when we rise and have breakfast; when it is right to take a shower, groom neatly, leave the house, arrive at an appointment, break for lunch and catch a train. While I do not have an alarm clock to remind me, I usually rise at 0600 and give myself a certain amount of time to attend to the routines of the morning. When something alters that routine, the day can become disoriented and lead to concerns, or be a wonderful distraction from the normal.

The writer of Ecclesiastes was a philosopher who was trying to make sense of God within the context of human existence. He could not understand the ways of God, who controls human destiny. Yet, in spite of this, he advised people to work hard, and to enjoy the gifts of God as much and as long as they could. He concludes eat, drink and enjoy what you have worked for.

Following the deaths of Queens Elizabeth II and Benjamin Cobbinah last month, many of the plans I had made were changed and time stood still for a while, enabling me to reflect and change my timings and expectations. We are reminded that there is a fine gossamer separating the things (and timings) of this world from the next. With this in mind perhaps we could all listen to the philosopher and consider what are the important things in our lives and organise our timings so that we get the most of the time we have.
