

We took possession of a 3 bedroom house at the end of 2023 on the Hatfield Road Estate. To make the project viable a fourth bedroom needed to be created by dividing the through lounge. Green Pastures from whom we lease the house were very supportive throughout and the cost of the alteration is repayable through the lease payments. Hence no major fund raising was required. Praise God!

Not surprisingly getting quotes for the work and fitting in with builders' availability was protracted but the work was completed by the beginning of March 2024. Because the house is multi-occupancy safety regulations are strict and it took time to get them in place. God's hand was with us throughout and we are blessed with volunteers who understand these things and can source our requirements.



It was exciting to move on to the stage of decorating & furnishing the house, buying essentials like bedding/towels etc. Praise God again for volunteers more than happy to wield a paint brush/put together flat pack furniture/scour charity shops for bits & bobs. We've ended up with a well furnished, welcoming house, one which brought exclamations of amazement from the visiting founder of Green Pastures & all who see it.

You can imagine the rejoicing when we

welcomed our first two residents at the beginning of May.

What a difference for them – a safe place to stay, somewhere to keep their belongings, facilities to keep themselves & their clothes clean & a place where you can make yourself a hot drink as and when you want to. They are so pleased with the accommodation and are keen to look after it & improve it (a paved backyard has become a garden of flowers).



Going forward, on the property side

we need to replace the flat roof on the extension. Quotations are being sought but this could be a major financial commitment.

For our residents, they need to be supported in order to address the issues which played a part in their homelessness & they need to find employment to enable them to move on to independent living. Today's employment market is not an easy place so we need to help them gain skills & confidence. Already they are helping out where possible, either voluntarily or for a small remuneration with things like gardening, tidying up church premises, outside painting jobs. If you are aware of any jobs they might be able to help out with, please let us know. They are very reliable guys.

Working & being alongside Christians and in a Christian environment reinforces to them the love of Christ, which set us on the path to this project originally. Two residents have signed up for the Alpha course starting at the URC on 18th September.

Seventeen villages and hundreds of people in WA district have benefited from the support that Witham URC has given

Background

The RURAL EVANGELISM OUTREACH TRUST or REOT was a trust set up to help the people of Wa, a district in the Upper West Region of Ghana, which is extremely remote and impoverished. It was to this district that Rev. Victor Donani and his wife Theresa were called by God, back in the 1990's to preach the Gospel and establish churches in the villages, many of which had little contact with the outside world. Despite difficulties Victor succeeded in planting 17 new churches, in this predominantly Muslim region.

In 2001 Victor and Theresa's daughter Charlotte Asamani and her husband Foster joined Witham United Reformed Church.

Subsequently in 2002 the then minister of Witham URC, Rev Richard Church, visited Wa and the surrounding villages and Witham URC became involved in supporting some of the projects which were designed to help the newly planted churches. Money was raised and sent and was spent on a Church in Sankana, paying for a roof and also providing training for the local Pastors, and other items such as bicycles, and a 4x4 vehicle were purchased. Money was also sent to support the villagers in a time of famine.

Whilst the formation of the new churches was extremely important, Victor also realized that the people were living in terrible poverty and he decided he should concentrate his efforts on trying to alleviate this.

In December 2005 Victor incorporated the Rural Evangelism Outreach Trust (REOT) in Ghana and he stated that the trust had the following vision. "We plan to kill the two troubling devils, serious hunger and severe poverty. The land is rich, wide and lying in waste while the people are suffering in the presence of these God given blessings'

Since handing over responsibility for the newly planted (17) churches to the Fountain Gate Organization. Victor became fully engaged with the work of REOT and set up a trial planting of Cassava with 55 groups of 8 people (440 people). Soap making began, 34 people were trained, some of the soap was kept and the rest sold to pay for more materials. A tree nursery was established in the village of Siiro to the south of Wa, Several acres of land was ploughed and cultivated and planted with maize and ground nuts. The farm project provided employment and training

A bill which would allow terminally ill adults, with six months or fewer to live, to get medical help to end their own lives has been introduced in the House of Lords, by former Labour Justice Secretary Lord Falconer. The issue has gained further prominence this year, partly because of Dame Esther Rantzen's revelation that she had joined Dignitas, the assisted dying clinic in Switzerland.

A bill to introduce assisted dying was last debated in the House of Commons in 2015, when it was defeated by 330 votes to 118. More recently there have been moves in Scotland, Jersey and the Isle of Man towards changing the law. A bill introduced by Lib Dem MSP Liam McArthur will be debated in the Scottish Parliament in the autumn.

In the Isle of Man, a bill was supported at its third reading by two-thirds of the island's parliamentary representatives, known as members of the House of Keys. It will now be considered by the Isle of Man's Legislative Council.

For some, there is little fear in death but a greater concern about dying and the journey that might be ahead. Few people would choose a painful end without dignity and independence, becoming a 'burden' on family members or the medical services.

However, that has not been my experience during 25 years of pastoral care and witnessing many pathways that people have taken. I have heard folk say, "I am ready now and wish the Lord would take me," but I have rarely heard a person ask for euthanasia. The expression, "You wouldn't let a dog suffer in that way!" is sometimes used as a reason for assisted dying, often by a third person looking in rather than the patient themselves. Modern palliative care practices and effective pain management reduces the suffering of many people in their last days.

The Bible says very little directly on this subject, beyond the universal understanding that humans are made in God's image and the sanctity of life with its associated commandment not to take the life of another. Jesus is never challenged on the subject nor does it come up in His general teachings.

My greater concern in this discussion is the chance that opening the possibility that someone can choose when they die in this manner may have unintended consequences enabling people to decide for others when their time on this earth should finish.
