Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends,

Autumn again!

Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness.... Which, to my shame, is the only line I remember from any of my many set texts from A levels.

Recently someone told me that autumn was their favourite season and I can see why because I really love the gradual change of the landscape from various shades of green to the beautiful array of warm colours that I associate with this time of year. I don't really appreciate the longer dark evenings or the cooler temperatures but, on the other hand, they are a wonderful excuse for enjoying a blazing fire.

Each season brings different changes with it; changes to the landscape and the weather, some of which we appreciate more than others. With the seasons we know that none is permanent, they are with us only for a season, literally, because winter will follow, then spring, then summer again. The fact that they are temporary and we will be back to our favourite in due course makes it so much easier to adapt, not that we have much choice of course.

It's not just the weather that has seasons, our lives do too. Sadly they are not cyclical. We might not want to revert to adolescence or young adulthood but there might be another season we would willingly enjoy again. Each season brings change with its challenges and opportunities which prepare us for the next season.

Some of our recent changes, especially those due to Covid, have been totally out of our control and we have had to accept these changes and adapt. This makes it much more unsettling and challenging when other things start changing around us. Having felt that we have lost control of our lives for eighteen months, the natural tendency is to want control back again. We are currently facing this challenge in our fellowship because the world has moved on and we have the choice of moving with it or getting left behind which has huge implications. Next year the URC will be 50 years old and when it was first established in 1972 there were 1400 full time ministers. Now there are just over one quarter of that number. Many churches have closed and almost all are shrinking, so most ministers have pastoral responsibility for at least two congregations. This is a sobering change of circumstances that many of us in Witham URC may have been oblivious to. Change, if we want to counter the decline in numbers, might be uncomfortable - but it seems hugely better than being part of the current trend of decline in church attendance.

My personal challenge is to remember that our Sunday services of worship should not revolve around what I am completely comfortable with or indeed around what anyone is entirely comfortable with; the focus has to be what will help us share the love of Jesus with those who don't yet know him as their Lord and Saviour. So please be gracious and endeavour to fulfil our vision of celebrating God and sharing the love of Jesus with our current community in a contemporary way.

November marks the beginning of Advent on Sunday 28th and our church AGM on Tuesday 23rd which includes the election of elders. Eldership is for those who are called to the role of spiritual leadership of our fellowship at this time. Although we are looking for lovely people of course, eldership is much more than just being a nice person. We need men and women whose faith is rooted in God's word, who are receptive to the guiding of the Spirit and ready to be a part of what God is doing and wants to do in our fellowship and community.

These are qualities that each of us should seek to grow because each and every one of us is a leader in some sense: there will always be others who look to us. Even a four year old can be a leader, intentionally or unintentionally, because a younger sibling will want to be like their older brother or sister and follow their example, be it good or bad.

As we get older we become more discerning about our role models in that we tend to actively choose them. In Romans (12:2) we read: Don't copy the behaviour and customs of this world, but let God transform you into a new person by changing the way you think. Then you will learn to know God's will for you, which is good and pleasing and perfect.

Who is God calling to serve him in the capacity of an elder at this time and in this place? Who is God calling to spiritual leadership for us? Please ask God for wisdom and discernment as you pray about it and follow His guidance. Nominations close at the end of Sunday 7th November.

I look forward to serving next year with the new eldership, all of us committed to celebrating God and sharing the love of Jesus, individually, as a fellowship and in the wider community of Witham.

Valleys of Learning: "Navigating through Missteps and Mistakes" source World International Ministries and provided by Olatunde Biyi

Disciples will face times of discouragement, doubt of calling, weights of the past, and weights of the flesh that have the potential of causing a misstep or mistake in serving the Lord. Missteps are just that—taking a step without the Lord, causing the disciple to miss the direction the Lord is leading or intending for the disciple.

Missteps happen when three areas of the disciple's life are affected: the heart, spiritual understanding, and what is acknowledged as help or provision. Out of the three things mentioned, the heart is most troublesome and deceptive. The heart is where the seat of our emotions resides; it is swayed easily by desire and self-promotion. The heart can deceive the mind, and the issues of life flow through it.

Emotions act on instinct from experience and the use of the five senses: touch, smell, hearing, tasting, seeing. Because of the fallen state of man, the first instinct of emotions is self-preservation. This instinct is "to protect at all costs regardless of the outcome." The second instinct to be used is the five human senses which govern the emotions: "what we see, what we hear, what we smell, what we taste, and what we feel causes emotions to act on the instinct of an experience."

Circumstances may arise to incite emotions to react without faith, causing a misstep with the Lord because the disciple focuses on the natural eye and not the spiritual eye. The natural eye pays attention to what is tangible and can move the emotions to fight or flight. The spiritual eye, which is insight, pays attention to the unseen spiritual world and relies on faith in God's abilities to navigate the disciple through any circumstance. Faith and insight are vehicles that take us into the unseen kingdom of God. Furthermore, insight introduces us to faith and helps build our faith.

In a sermon I preached entitled "The Spiritual Eye," God reveals something in the Bible that was a new revelation to what the scripture meant in Isaiah. God shows a powerful understanding of the spiritual eye and natural eye through the parable in the book of Matthew. In the book of Matthew, Jesus talks about the spiritual eye and ear versus the natural eye and ear; the spiritual and natural hinges on the ability of the disciple to be able to be teachable and learn the difference.

Jesus is speaking in this scripture, and it breaks down like this: "Therefore I speak to them in parables . . ." Note: parables are designed to teach people something—in the case of Jesus, spiritual principles and teachings of the unseen kingdom of God. "Because seeing (naturally) they do not see (spiritually) and hearing (naturally) they do not hear (spiritually), nor do they understand (spiritually). Moreover, in them, the prophecy of Isaiah is fulfilled, which says. Hearing (naturally) you will hear (naturally) and shall not understand (spiritually) and seeing (naturally) you will see (naturally) and not perceive (spiritually); For the hearts of this people have grown dull. Their ears are hard of hearing (spiritually), and their eyes they have closed (spiritually), lest they should see (spiritually) with their ears, lest they should understand (spiritually) with their hearts and turn so that I should heal them."

Our faith plays an important part in seeing and hearing spiritually. The disciple must train themselves in the spiritual things of God and exercise the spiritual senses that they may understand every time God speaks or every time they read the word of God. Dealing with humanity's five senses, when provoked, the intuitive experience through the senses causes them to act based on memory, pushing out the substance of faith in God. Smell, taste, touch, hearing, and seeing trigger memory. If something terrible is experienced through the five senses, it is more probable that the person will not trust the spiritual senses and the unseen world. The memory of a bad experience triggers the emotional state recreating the experience, therefore acting out of the natural rather than the spiritual, rendering the heart

deceived from memory. "The heart is deceitful above all things and desperately wicked; who can know it?"

When the heart is deceived, it ceases learning what is true and leans on memory and emotions, and then holds on to the false perceptions of God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit's abilities to deliver or save. The disciple must master protecting the heart and continually inundate the heart with the truth of God's word. God's truths make the heart free of issues that come to convolute and destroy the work of learning and understanding—the making and walk of the disciple. The disciple's walk is based on the teachings of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

Recognise when it's wise to compromise source Word for today 27/9/2021 - and provided by Olatunde Biyi.

'That I might by all means save some.' 1 Corinthians 9:22 NKJV

Paul wouldn't yield an inch on Bible truth, but when it came to customs, traditions, and people's preferences, he refused to fight about them. For example, some of the Corinthian Christians thought because certain meats were offered in worship to idols it was sinful to eat them.

So did Paul handle it by standing up and declaring, 'I'm not going to allow you to impose your unscriptural convictions on me'? No. He wrote: 'Some are accustomed to thinking of idols as...real, so when they eat food that has been offered to idols, they think of it as the worship of real gods, and their weak consciences are violated. It's true that we can't win God's approval by what we eat. We don't lose anything if we don't eat it, and we don't gain anything if we do. But you must be careful so that your freedom does not cause others with a weaker conscience to stumble' (1 Corinthians 8:7-9 NLT).

Then he bottom-lines it by saying, 'I try to find common ground with everyone, doing everything I can to save some' (1 Corinthians 9:22 NLT). God didn't call us to win theological arguments; He called us to win people to Christ. So be gracious towards those who don't think like you, dress like you, or care about some of the things you care about. Be gracious towards those whose worship style and fine points of theology differ from yours. 'Be patient with each other, making allowance for each other's faults because of your love. Make every effort to keep yourselves united in the Spirit, binding yourselves together with peace' (Ephesians 4:2-3 NLT).

URC Daily Devotional Read at Peter Howard's Service on Sunday, 25th October

Proverbs 6: 16 - 19

There are six things that the Lord hates, seven that are an abomination to him: haughty eyes, a lying tongue, and hands that shed innocent blood, a heart that devises wicked plans, feet that hurry to run to evil, a lying witness who testifies falsely,

and one who sows discord in a family.

Reflection

We may be tempted to think that this passage only applies to criminals. However, it sounds like an average day on **social media** to me.

"My opinion matters the most."

"I'm going to share this article without fact checking it or checking the source."

"People may die from misinformation shared, but that is not my problem." "I'm going to really upset this person with my version of facts."

"I'm going to be quick to respond, because they need to know how wrong they are."

"Truth is irrelevant anyway."

"We are already divided."

Not just for criminals, these words serve as a warning to you and me too. Typed words can lead to as many deaths as a weapon. Don't believe me? In a recent White House Press Conference (July 2021), people were warned about misinformation on the internet being initiated by just a handful of people and then subsequently "shared" many times - leading to thousands not taking up the vaccine in the States and to many more hospitalisations and deaths.

So those articles we share matter.

WHAT IF ... WE

humbled ourselves and considered what others think or have to say fact checked things and carefully read articles before "liking" or sharing?
work to help stop the spread of false information(and gossip)?
had conversations, rather than fought to "win" an argument?
waited 24 hours before responding to something?
celebrated truth? acknowledged our divisions and sought to build bridges?
applied this not just to social media but to church, family and community?

What is going on? - part (1) and Good News – part (2) - Rod Gayton

Part (1) -

At my most recent House Group session, during my relentless hassling of folk to consider Eldership, especially those Elders currently non-serving, in post Sunday Service conversations - to name but three - similar 'What is going on?' questions have been a recurring theme. Here are a few of them

- Many detailed worship-format questions.
- What on earth was that all about in part of the September Church Meeting hopefully the Minutes will clarify that.
- Did Ian really say at that meeting, that, following a large loss in 2020, he was worried about the possibility of larger losses this year and also during the next two years? Did Covid have such an impact? I had always thought that we had loads of money!
- What is M&M? (I do wish that folk adopted complete words, rather than lazy initials! It stands for Ministry and Mission.) Gavin briefly mentioned it at the September Church Meeting, but it was not on the agenda. Ian said that having being so instructed by Elders, he had already accepted the £74,000 + proposal from Eastern Synod. Should not Church Meeting have been, somehow, involved in the decision process for that kind of outgoing?
- Why do Church Meetings go on for so long, I lose focus after 90 minutes!
- What has caused Fenella to suddenly become so visible and vocal recently.
- I just don't get the eldership numbers thing. First, they need 14, then it's 7 but with 2 leaving we suddenly need 9. At my old church, the Minister, chosen by us, met up with one or two trusted, experienced, long-term friends, and then just got on with it; seemed to work pretty well!

• What's happened to most of our teenagers, it seems as if they have suddenly stopped attending Sunday am worship. Who is supporting Viv and Tracey to counter this?

Part (2) -

How can I possibly follow that with **GOOD NEWS?** Well, I think that I can, and I am proud to do so!

I diagnose that we are suffering a severe case of pretty-much unfettered freedom.

I believe that there should be a healthy tension between, on the one hand, order and form, and on the other hand, freedom. I'll put it another way, FORM needs FREEDOM to keep it fresh and FREEDOM needs FORM to prevent it from turning into irresponsible chaos. However, I believe that we have the form to rapidly re-acquire our earlier, acceptably harmonious, happy, contented, progressive state.

The answer lies with us. **Yes** – that's all of us individuals in the fellowship be we young/old, recent arrivals/long-time members, traditional/ absolutely new modern music lovers, historic/new, quite different, worship-format lovers, and so on. It is in our hands; we just need to pick up the many time-proven tools available to us.

Who are we? There are other major national churches within Witham -Anglican, Roman Catholic, Methodist, plus a wide choice of locally-led Evangelical Churches, but our fellowship is a member Church within the Eastern Synod of the United Reformed Church; hence we have strong external support.

What does this afford us? Well, currently we are utilising the experience of the Eastern Synod Moderator, with the aim of clarifying, and then bringing to an end, an internal long-standing issue. Our Home Group Leaders will, next month, meet together to widen their individual experience, with the help of two well-qualified ladies from Eastern Synod. Ian is, and has been for many months, heavily involved in a project aimed to much-improve the current state of the URC Ministerial Pension Fund.

What form do we have ourselves? Well, we have a written Constitution, adopted by the membership. We have a Minister, an Associated Minister, plus a Children and Youth Pastor with an Assistant C&Y Pastor. Then we have our Eldership structure, supported by a number of Committees, or similar groups. Thus, much of the detailed administration of church life lies with Committees, freeing up time at Elders and Church Meeting for the more important issues, and importantly, offering involvement opportunities to the wider fellowship. We, unsurprisingly, rely heavily on volunteers from within the fellowship in the expression and delivery of the services provided, both in regular worship and with our outreach.

Current Committees/Worship/Discipleship and Growth/Mission and Outreach/Children and Youth/Property/Finance - meet as frequently as necessary to enable them to perform their duties adequately. Each of them, having individual remits, has at least one Elder as a member, the rest being made up of people with an interest in the subject.

All Committees welcome new members. Anyone in the fellowship interested in serving on one or more Committees should make contact with the relevant Elder. The next Worship Committee Meeting, for instance, is due to be held, hopefully prior to the AGM.

Elders meet monthly to review the activities of the Church, and to receive reports from the supporting Committees. Recommendations are made to Church Meeting, which meets every other month. Elders keep under review the ability to finance the agreed activities of the Church and the risks presented by externalities - Covid 19 being a recent example. All major decisions are made in principle, by the Elders before being put to the meeting of Church Members. In common with the practices of the United Reformed Church, the Church Meeting is the ultimate decision-making body of Witham United Reformed Church. November brings our next Church Meeting, the AGM, with Annual Reports from most areas of Church life, the election of Elders, and also, the opportunity for individuals to seek answers to their myriad of Part-1 type questions.

Our form, our structure, is there - why not recognise that fact and utilise it!
