Pastoral Letter

Friends,

In our calendar the old year closes in December and the new one begins in January (although in this country the financial year is very different). It is fortunate that those who picked a date to celebrate the birth of Jesus chose the 25th of December because, whenever the date of his birth really was, it marked the end of the old world and the start of the new one.

On that day God entered the world as a human baby and changed it utterly. God was no longer distant and judgemental; but among us and preparing us for the salvation to be brought about by the death of that baby, Jesus. God's message of love for humanity and desire to prevent people from deservedly being judged for their sins brought, and still brings, ecstatic joy and relief to those who believe the Christmas message – that God came into the world to save us from ourselves.

These are quite small things but they have the potential to make other people ask themselves “Why?”, Why focus on a baby? Why go to church? Why think about others and not yourself?

God changed the world. Help someone discover that truth for themselves.

In these days of correct-ness I am sure that we no longer hear references to the fairer or weaker sex, somehow believing that males are stronger than females. In the Advent studies at ChristChurch we were looking at some women in the Bible who displayed strength, courage, power and fortitude. In preparing for the first study, I was challenged to draw out some comparisons between Eve and Sarah. In their unions and relationships with Adam and Abraham would we say that the women were in anyway inferior to their husbands? In the second study Ruth was the focus and Mary was studied in weeks three and four; her Annunciation and Visitation.

The preparation got me thinking, although I am not sure as a male whether I can truly reflect on the historic and continuing subordination of women. What was it like when humankind first started populating the world? Was gender discrimination prevalent from the very beginning? Some people do believe that women were born subordinate to men and patriarchy existed from the very beginning. According to the Greek philosopher Aristotle, *'men are always active and women are passive'*. The biological difference of women makes them inferior in their capacity, ability to reason and therefore the ability to make decisions, according to him.

However, these theories of male supremacy have been challenged, and it has been demonstrated that there is no historical or scientific evidence for such explanations. There are biological differences between men, women and other genders in the spectrum, but these differences do not have to be the foundation of a sexual hierarchy in which men are dominant. Evidence from primate social groups like chimpanzees shows that food sharing takes place with matrifocal (mother centred) groups rather than between sexual mates. The women were in the centre of the social group and were in

charge of carrying infants, teaching their culture to their infants, and distributing food to the group.

When humans began to settle and become domesticated, it heralds the change from equality to patriarchy. The land and the animals were valuable assets that needed to be protected from intruders. As a result, wars began. Invaders seized the property of the opposition, which included women. It was done to demonstrate power. Women became property, possessions to be territorially owned. Women had to be domesticated and confined, and their sexuality regulated and controlled, in order to establish the right of men over them. A scrutiny of history does show that gender roles and power equations as we see today were created to retain male dominance and supremacy.

As we begin to look into the future, how will a feminist imperative unravel the inequalities and unfairness that now exists? Has male privilege become so ingrained into our societal thinking that we are unable to avoid its affects? We go into a new year and maybe 2023 will be the time when men accept their need to treat women as equal in every way. What would make a difference?

It can be so easy to feel overwhelmed at this time of year. The shops are busy, there is often a loud soundtrack of Christmas music playing, and the shelves are piled up almost to the ceiling in some cases with tubs of chocolates and sweets, special offers and promotions. We can all find ourselves running a constant mental to-do list of presents to buy or make, cards to write, last posting dates, school nativity play dates....it can all be just too much at times.



When I feel myself feeling overwhelmed, I try and clear my mind just for a moment or two and refocus on the reason for the season. There is a particular rendition of “Joy to The World” by Sufjan Stevens which I love to listen to. I find it calming and beautiful – if you haven’t heard his version before, it is worth looking up on YouTube or similar.

In a season which can feel like the commercial message is ‘more, more, more’ I reflect on the line ‘let every heart prepare him room’ and try and hold on to that calming message instead. To replace the feeling of overwhelm with a feeling of quiet anticipation and preparedness.

It can be hard to feel calm and prepared when not only your senses are overwhelmed, but your purse is feeling pressured too. This year more than ever it feels that prices have risen higher than before, money doesn’t go as far as it used to, and there can be a strong temptation to pay for things using credit with the intention to pay it off in January.
