Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends,

The good news of Christmas is that even when the world or our circumstances change, the message of Christmas is timeless. Because Christmas is about the birth of God's son – Jesus. It is about how He came to save us and give us love, hope, and joy.

Recently in our house group we have been studying the letters of Paul. In Paul's letter to the Corinthian Church, he writes in chapter 13:13 'And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love'. Paul wrote that love endures forever. Love is the greatest of all human qualities and is the attribute of God himself. Love involves unselfish service to others.

In John chapter 13:34 it reads 'I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you.... By this everyone will know that you are my disciples if you have love for one another'. To love others was not a new commandment (Leviticus 19:18) but to love others as much as Christ loved others was radical. Now we are to love others base on Jesus' sacrificial love for us. Such love will not only bring unbelievers to Christ, but it will also keep believers strong and united in a world hostile to God. Jesus was a living example of God's love, as we are to be living examples of Jesus' love.

Love is an attitude that reveals itself in action by helping when it's not convenient, by giving when it hurts, by devoting enough energy to other's welfare rather than our own, by absorbing hurts from others without complaining or fighting back. This kind of love is hard to do and that is why people notice when you do it and know that you are empowered by God's Holy Spirit.

Now since love isn't what you say or but what you do – today go out and find practical ways to express God's love to those you meet. They will feel good, and you will too. You may have a neighbour who is lonely or a friend

or relative in need or someone that you meet in your daily walk whose life you could uplift or turn around. Christmas is for giving.

Pledge Committee - Deborah Robinson

Each year we give 10% of the churches offering income and allocate this to charities through the Pledge Committee. Back in September the church meeting agreed to support 9 charities through donations from our Pledge. As a committee we would like the church to not just give money but to gain an understanding of each of the 9 charities we chose to support, and to offer our prayer support to them as well. Over the coming months we will focus on each charity so we can all learn more about them.

PAPYRUS – Prevention of Young Suicide

During January we will be looking at PAPYRUS, a charity working to prevent young suicide, promote positive mental health and emotional wellbeing in young people. It is an awful fact that suicide is the biggest killer of people aged 35 and under in the UK. PAPYRUS was founded in 1997 by a group of bereaved parents who had



each lost children to suicide. They knew that those who have lived experience of suicide have a valuable and unique contribution to make to widen the conversation around the subject and to help prevent others suffering in the same way. Most of the current Trustees have also experienced personal loss through suicide.

PAPYRUS run a free, confidential 24 helpline that has phone, text, webchat and email service. They also deliver suicide prevention education and training packages to thousands of people each year, going into workplaces, schools, universities and communities. The trained advisers on the helpline are also there to help and guide those who are supporting a young person during difficult times.

One of PAPYRUS's current projects is called 'Save the class'. Over 200 teenagers are lost to suicide every year in the UK. One in ten teachers said on average a student shares suicidal thoughts with them once a term or

more, and yet teachers do not feel equipped to support these students. PAPYRUS has developed a guide to suicide prevention, intervention and postvention in schools and colleges for teachers and wider staff. This aims to equip school and college staff with the skills and knowledge to support a student who may be having suicidal thoughts.

Suicide is everyone's business, far too many of us have been affected or know someone who has been affected by suicide. Do make use of PAPYRUS if you need to or signpost a person to them for help. I'm sure that your generous donation through the Pledge Committee will save lives of young people and help the people who love them.

Alternative gifts – Rwanda Style - Shirley Ratnage

Christian Hope International, a small charity based in Harold Wood has worked in Rwanda since the genocide and have in the past received grants from our Pledge Committee. They sponsor 550 children,



paying school fees and health insurance. All of their work is through the Anglican church in the country and in addition to the sponsorship, they fund projects such as vocational training, supporting community nurses, prison work, repairs to schools/churches, start up loans etc.

In their latest magazine we read that a rural church which had been renovated to meet government building standards, gave their pastor a live cockerel to celebrate the occasion, with a note saying:' this is to wake you up so early to come to deal with our issues, when you wake early everything is done on time for the good of the people being served.' At least he won't have to worry about the battery running out.

Rwanda is in the news at present for the wrong reasons. I visited with the charity 20 years ago and the country was in a dire state. I will be visiting again in January 2024 specifically to meet the children I sponsor. I am expecting to see great changes in the country, especially as I will only be staying in the capital Kigali, however the needs of the poorer people remain.

Some children don't get an education because their parents can't afford the school fees. CHI run a scheme where you can donate money (I think £5 per term) to ensure students get a meal at lunchtime (maybe their only meal of the day) As Jesus said ' the poor, you will always have with you.' In any society, progress often leaves some communities behind. It is good to have the opportunity to help some of these people, who are equally precious to God.

I look forward to my visit and updating you on the situation on my return.

Charities supported by the Christmas Plate - Bob Stibbards

The Christmas plate is to be divided equally between CHESS Homeless and Mid and North East Essex Mind.

CHESS Homeless

CHESS was originally set up by Churches Together in Chelmsford and many of the churches in Chelmsford and the surrounding area have generously supported CHESS ever since. In fact,



many of our trustees and volunteers have been drawn from their congregations. They have two chaplains that regularly visit the night shelter who offer prayers and support to residents if they wish.

Being able to offer shelter can have a long-lasting effect on someone. CHESS has a number of properties that offer shelter to those who have been homeless. The first stop is the Shelter (this property is staffed with support workers), from there it's a move to the Annex and from there to one of their move on properties.

In addition to the Shelter and move-on accommodation across Essex, CHESS provides outreach services to rough sleepers in 8 local authorities – Chelmsford, Maldon, Braintree, Rochford, Epping, Brentwood, Castle Point and Uttlesford. Once a rough sleeper is referred the team will visit the person concerned to assess their immediate needs, providing emergency items as required. They also have rooms available at another property for emergency cases, and may be able to provide temporary accommodation (72 hours), a hot shower and meal etc, after an initial assessment.

Counselling

Counselling is a talking therapy which involves talking to a trained professional about your thoughts, feelings and behaviour. They have a free counselling service as well as a private counselling service, both are for people aged 18 and over.

Futures in Mind

If you are looking for support with recovery from mental health problems and/or substance and alcohol misuse? Futures in Mind is a service designed for people across Essex to help.

Youthful Wellbeing Service

Working in partnership with local Minds, this service offers support to young adults aged 18-25 who are experiencing mental health problems.

Practical Support

If you are an adult living with a mild to moderate mental health problem and need information, advice and practical support to get help from other local services and organisations, our Support Time and Recovery Service (STaRS) is here to help.

Personality Disorder Support Service

If you are an adult living with a Personality Disorder in Mid Essex, our practical support service is here to help.

The following is a transcript of his video

"Hi

As you know we've been here at High Leigh with the Gear Committee and Refreshing Your Ministry conference and I just want to do a prayer that talks about, really, what we felt we had on our heart, that God had laid on our heart. There's all sorts of stuff from laying things down and being obedient and allowing God to speak into our lives and that. But most of all, what we thought of was this whole idea of reclaiming the word evangelism and not just reclaiming the word, but doing it. How do we do that in our churches?

How do we do that in our Synods?

How do we actually encourage the church, the wider church, our national church to take on board?

What evangelism truly is rather than just talking about the word? And to just do it.

So let's just pray right now,

Father God, we thank you that we are encouraged by you to go into all the world and give the good news and we pray right now that we might be a church that understands that this is our main thing. You have called us going to all the world to preach the gospel and to give the good news to those around us.

Father, as a church, helpless, as United Reformed Church, help us to understand that evangelism isn't something we're frightened of, that comes from somewhere else. Evangelism is a gift from you - that we need to be able to speak of our faith, to talk about our Jesus, and to encourage those around us to do the same.

So, Father, we pray for our denomination, we pray for us as a GEAR committee, that we might be able to encourage and build up and to be supportive in all these discussions. But more than discussions, to encourage us to just do it, to enable us to be your people in obedience to you, working with the knowledge of what you've given us, that we are empowered to do it. And that we are expecting to be able to see things happen, to be able to see people come to know you, Father.

How was working in Parliament?

Working in Parliament was a real eve-opener! It was crazily busy, but also so interesting to see the ins and outs of government. You really pick up the buzz of the place. I came to understand much better the processes behind how laws get made.

Which residentials did you go on?

We had two residential trips across the year, and some weekends as well. We went to L'Abri, where we got to know one another and shared stories and presentations about ourselves, and we learnt how to discuss and debate well. We also had a week in Scotland, visiting the Scottish Parliament and spending time debating some core theological topics!

What do you do now?

I now work in the Civil Service within the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, helping with trade policy negotiations around food hygiene in our free-trade agreements.

How did the Leadership Programme prepare you for that?

The Leadership Programme helped me in so many ways: it helped me improve my communication and my written skills, and I learnt a lot about myself. It particularly helped me to develop resilience, not only in seeing projects through, but also in the building up of my character into the person God is making me to be. I also learnt how to love and care for others in a meaningful and compassionate way.

How would you recommend the CARE Leadership Programme?

The Leadership Programme is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. I've never seen anything like it before, and it's an amazing experience to get into the heart of politics as a Christian. I was able to discuss the deep theological issues of our day with like-minded Christians, and it's something which will stick with me for the rest of my life. It was a real blessing.



Were there any particular standout moments?

Speech writing and co-writing a chapter of a book with my MSP were particularly memorable. I was also tasked with improving engagement between my MSP and church leaders

What did you go on to do next?

I went immediately from the Leadership Programme to working for the Scottish Conservative Research Unit at the Scottish Parliament, eventually becoming Head of Research for the Scottish Conservative MSP Group. I then spent five years as an elected councillor, becoming the Local Authority's Depute Leader and Transport spokesperson. I combined this role for a time with working for The Christian Institute in Scotland on specific campaigns. After a period of theological training I then spent 3 1/2 years as a pastor in north-east England before returning to Scotland, and shortly thereafter taking up my present role as Scotland Policy Officer back at CARE literally coming full circle!

How did the Leadership Programme prepare you for that?

The Leadership Programme gave me invaluable experience of working in a political setting, and in the Scottish Parliament specifically, allowing me to 'hit the ground' running when I started working there. The contacts I made during the Scotland-based Friday sessions have proved extremely valuable in my subsequent work, including my current work two decades later.

How would you recommend the CARE Leadership Programme?

I would advise any Christian with a passion for politics, and who is eager to better understand the interface between their faith and their politics, to seize the Leadership Programme with both hands. I cannot recommend it highly enough.

If God had a heavenly store cupboard, it would be filled with love, mercy, forgiveness and compassion. He doesn't need a store cupboard though, because his supplies are endless, and they are always there for us. Sadly the same cannot be said of our earthly cupboards, and in these times, more and more people are finding that their food cupboards are empty and they do not have the means to refill them. Recently, members of our church have felt God calling us to do His work in the community by relieving some of this suffering through our Community Pantry.

This is opened for those who are experiencing hard times, and they are able to take dried goods, tins, packets, as well as some frozen food away with them. Those who have used it have described it as a lifeline, and it is a practical way for us to show God's love.

If you are able to support the Community Pantry, it would be valued and appreciated, and will help relieve hardship in our community. One way you could do this is to add an item to your shopping list as often as you can afford to, and donate it to the larder. Here are some ideas of the kinds of things that we are providing:

Dr. Rev. Peter Stevenson provided for Jean Moody, Great Totham URC

We cannot peak too quickly and get to the cradle before the conception; the first trimester and ultrasound; the announcement (with the hope of no complications); the second trimester with associated scans and check-ups; the third trimester when bags get packed, preparatory purchases made and the nursery decorated. At any point along the way Amazon Marketplace may be consulted in case bargains can be found. While the weeks may pass quickly there is nevertheless a lot of waiting. The countdown towards the expected delivery date might be shared by a number of people. Most of the waiting time is used to get everyone and everything ready. But ready for what?

For the mother and father life is likely to change, especially if it is their first child. Uninterrupted sleep may become a distant memory and pamper days may be restricted to the occasional bubble bath without the baby demanding attention. The baby, at best, represents a physical expression of the love shared by a woman and a man; an extension of personalities and a sealing of the covenant made by the couple.

Thinking about Jesus for a moment, and the three parents of his birth (this is going to get complicated). Theologically and biologically, Mary and God are the parents that enter into an agreed and consenting relationship in order to give birth, while Joseph accepts the responsibility of being an earthly father. (In Catholic understanding, Jesus' brothers and sisters can only be born to Joseph through a different relationship as Mary remains a virgin – despite giving birth to Jesus). Mary's trimesters were challenging as she sought acceptance from Joseph; sanctuary with Elizabeth; protection from Herod and travelling mercies along the way. Mary's experience of giving birth reminds us that not every child is fortunate enough to be surrounded by health professionals, sanitized conditions and supportive families – even today.

As the reader knows, I have a vested interest in this subject at this time as I await my first grandchild, a girl due on 14th February 2024. My overwhelming waiting emotion is hope. Hope that everything goes well for mum, dad and bump; hope that I can be a loving, attentive and devoted "Pops"; hope that Granny can get to the hospital at the right time; hope that bump can look forward to a safe, nurturing and fulfilling life. I wonder what Heli (Luke 3:23), or was it Jacob (Matthew 1:16) thought?
