Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends

Come let us sing for joy to the Lord. Let us shout aloud to the Rock of our salvation. Let us come before him with thanksgiving, and extol him with music and song. For the Lord is the great God, The great King above all gods. (Psalm 95 1-3)

It's often the case that when great things happen, it's easy to be thankful, but when times are tough, sometimes we find it hard to give thanks. The fact of the matter is that we have an overwhelming reason to be grateful because of what Jesus has done for us. Jesus gave His very life for us, giving us the gift of eternal life. On top of rescuing us from death, He also gave us access to the throne of God and a loving relationship with our Creator. He gave us a place to belong in the family of God and He gave us the gift of the Holy Spirit – a comforter, counsellor, and ever-present friend. He took away our sins, and with Jesus, we are destined to live in hope, victory and to have eternal life! Gratitude begins with realising that Jesus is the 'Rock of our salvation'. When we realise what Jesus has done for us, an attitude of gratefulness should flow freely from our hearts.

In Paul's letter to the Thessalonians, he wrote to the Thessalonian Christians to strengthen their faith and to give them assurance of Christ's return. Paul was not teaching that we should thank God for everything that happens to us, but in everything. Evil does not come from God, so we should not thank Him for it. But when evil strikes, we can still be thankful for God's presence in our lives and for the good that He will accomplish through those challenging times.

Give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus.

(1 Thessalonians 5:18)

In our house group, we are currently looking at the story of Joseph from the Andrew Ollerton series. Joseph's early life was an absolute 'rollercoaster' of challenging circumstances, in which God turned Joseph's nightmare into a life filled with purpose and 'used for good'. Joseph always knew that God was with him, and he seldom questioned why but 'What shall I do now?' There is nothing like God's presence to shed new light on a dark situation.

Thankfulness opens the door to God's presence. When thankfulness flows freely from your heart and lips, your gratitude will draw you closer to God. See how many times you can thank God daily; this will awaken your awareness to a multitude of blessings. It will also cushion the impact of challenges when they come against you.

There are five ways in which we can be thankful:

- 1) We can be thankful that God answers our prayers (Isaiah 65:24; John 11:41).
- 2) We can be thankful for God's provision for our needs (1 Thessalonians 17,18; 1 Timothy 4:4, 5)
- 3) We can be thankful for God's blessings (1 Chronicles 16:34; Philippians 4;6)
- 4) We can be thankful for God's character and wondrous works (Psalm 17:17; 2 Corinthians 9:15)
- 5) We can be thankful for our brothers and sisters in Christ (1 Corinthians 1:4; Ephesians 1:16)

May God continue to bless you and your families.

Have you considered having an allotment? Julie Harris

Have you ever considered having an allotment ?

Do you have preconceptions about them ? Then please let me clarify a few points for you.

First and foremost for me, I love being at my allotment and enjoying being close to God and to nature.

I have had my allotment for 3 years now and feel so very fortunate. I knew that as I approached my retirement, I would love to have an allotment. I first applied for a plot at Cut Throat Lane allotments in Witham, but was informed the waiting list was long, I went on the waiting list and got a phone call 2 years later offering me a plot, I politely declined as I had been very fortunate in finding another plot.

Allotments are literally like gold dust, so I was overjoyed when I got mine.

So.....what do you conjure up when you think of an allotment? Expense? Hard Work? Little or no success?

Well....please allow me to share my experience. Someone that I know suggested I try Hatfield Peverel Allotment Association...they have 2 sites, an old site which probably dates back 100 years and a new site.

I was overjoyed to be offered a plot virtually straight away. I knew what I wanted and was delighted to be offered a starter plot, which is a half a plot. A starter plot is for people who want to dip their toe in the water and see how they get on with it, some people stick with that size, others like to upgrade to a larger plot.

Having an allotment isn't expensive, for my little plot the fee is less than \pounds 40 a year. There is equipment onsite you can use, for a fee and with some safety training.

We are a friendly community and help each other out with advice or seed sharing etc.

So....why get an allotment ?

It's great to be out in nature, fresh air, sociable, you are helping the planet the crops you grow will be totally organic and fresh.

To grow your own fruit and veg is good for the planet in terms of carbon footprint, plastic wrapping and for your health. It's rewarding when you get a good crop and the seeds, compost, birds etc. Works out a fraction of what you would pay in a shop for the end product.

With the way things are going, I think fruit and veg are going to go up in price, if farmers are impacted by the Budget, there are many reasons why prices might go up, but I think they will.

So.....allotments are becoming more scarce, I feel very nostalgic about the site where mine is, possibly our great grand parents had one, they are historical, precious and should be protected at all costs.

If you think you might be interested, please go to this link and register your interest, the waiting list is considerably short....believe me, the joy of going over my allotment early on a Summer morning or watering on a warm summer evening as the sun dips is absolutely priceless....there will be lots of support and advice to get you up and running, if you need it...we are a really friendly bunch.

Speaking of nostalgia, you can always pack a sandwich and a flask of tea and spend the day over there, it's glorious !!!!




Lunchtime concert Thursday 12th December - Lorna

There will be a special lunchtime concert by candlelight at 12.30pm. It's a solo performance, an inspiring sequence of 'Reflections', focusing on peace and freedom with beautiful unaccompanied melody and classic poetry. It will be played and presented by bassoonist Laurence Perkins, who is regularly featured on Classic FM, BBC Radio 3 and has had two solo recordings in the U.K. Classical Charts.

The concert is 45 minutes long, and is free admission. There will be a collection for two charities - UK-Med, a World Health Organisation medical team, and Action Music International who work through music to help and support traumatised war victims. Both organisations are currently very active in Ukraine, Gaza and other war-torn parts of the world.

Rev Dr Peter Stevenson - sent by Jean Moody Great Totham URC

As many of you know our house starts early in preparation for Christmas. By mid-November the presents are bought and wrapped; the festive menus are set and non-perishable items purchased; the cake is maturing; Advent study, services, and the December diary is finalised and travel arrangements made. Why? Early preparation means that changes can easily be made without adding pressure to the schedules; the mind can be cleared so that deeper reflection can occur; and the season can be enjoyed rather than endured.

I have been reading Stephen Cottrell *Walking Backwards to Christmas*, the study book for the Advent course [Stamford members can access this via Zoom on Thursday evenings – happy to supply details on request] taking the nativity all the way back to Moses and the burning bush. The study will consider the perspectives of Old and New Testament characters in order to reflect on how God has brought Light to the world.

Another book I have enjoyed in the pre-Advent period is Paul Kerensa *Hark! The Biography of Christmas,* [Paul writes a regular epilogue feature for Reform]. In twelve chapters he takes the reader from 4BC to the present exploring how a pagan festival becomes the Christmas celebration we now regard as 'normal'. The churches' involvement and engagement came fairly late into the story, even banning it during the Puritan and Reformation periods. In 1575 Scotland, Christmas Day became Yule Day with punishments imposed on those found playing, dancing and singing 'filthy' carols. It was not reinstated until 1618 by order of King James but nobody turned up and the festival was re-banned in 1640. It was not until 1958 that Scotland officially reinstated Christmas – in the meantime a New Year ceremony, Hogmanay, filled the gap. The present-day Christmas has been shaped by royal banquets, an enterprising American entrepreneur, a Prince regent and a Victorian storyteller. The church only added the majority of the carols we sing today in the twentieth century so the next time you hear someone say that we have lost the true meaning of Christmas, ask them what true meaning they have in mind! For Christians, let us recapture the nativity story as we start another liturgical journey of discovery in the hope of understanding Jesus, our Lord, better.
